Expecting Hope

I continue to be alarmed by the increasing number of young women we are diagnosing every year. Even more concerning is how many of them were pregnant or within five years of having a baby at the time of diagnosis.

Studies confirm there is a unique danger in postpartum breast cancers. Most focus on the risk of metastasis, cancer spreading to other organs, which is **50% higher** among those diagnosed within five years of giving birth than those who had not given birth. One study revealed that in women **55 years and younger**, breast cancer risk peaked about five years after they gave birth, with risk for mothers being **80% higher** compared with women who did not give birth. Postpartum status may be a prognostic indicator in young women with breast cancer and should be routinely identified, as up to **45% of women** 45 years or younger with breast cancer fall into this category and could be at increased risk for metastasis.

That's a lot of words for saying **women who have given birth need to be aware of their risk of breast**

cancer. Yes, some will argue women have enough to deal with just having a child. I agree. Yet, the reality is a lump cannot be ignored. Too many times it is dismissed as simply a result of changes in the breast. But it needs a definitive diagnosis and young women must insist on that extra step.

It is one thing to read the studies and see this fact confirmed in The Rose's statistics but quite another to witness this issue in real life. Of all the survivors I have interviewed for the Let's Talk About Your Breasts Podcast, **nearly half** were diagnosed within a few years of a child's birth. When I listen to their stories, the hardships they endured are incredible and their worry about not being alive to raise their children is a real concern. Recently, I was at an event talking with a community partner whose wife was diagnosed 25 years ago. He mentioned their daughter was two years old when she was diagnosed. Even 25 years ago, it was an issue!

Another reality is that if a woman is uninsured, another trip to the doctor or having a mammogram or ultrasound test is financially out of reach.

Oddly, the same cost factor often applies to the insured woman. Since she has an issue, her test will be considered diagnostic. This means the cost of it will most often go against her deductible and must be paid out of pocket. At some healthcare facilities, (not The Rose), testing can run as high as \$3,000.

If she is under the age of 40, (the standard recommended age for mammography) many practitioners will think she is too young for a mammogram.

One thing we are certain about, no one is too young to have breast cancer.

A look at the youngest women diagnosed by The Rose over the past six years.

Only **one** of these women **did not** have children.

I believe there is a real need to raise awareness about the possible risk of developing breast cancer after childbirth. Advocacy for this awareness is part of our mission and commitment to the community.



In the face of cancer treatments, Courtney stands strong, embracing the roles of both a warrior in her health battle and a devoted mother to her two young children.

MEET COURTNEY

Courtney was only 36 years old when she was diagnosed with Invasive Ductal Carcinoma, the most common type of breast cancer. But Courtney's diagnosis wasn't so simple, because she was breastfeeding a toddler at home and was 23 weeks pregnant. Courtney was in a battle for her life, and for her unborn baby's life.

Pregnancy & Breast Cancer

Studies confirm there is a unique danger in postpartum breast cancers.

The risk of cancer metastasizing is 50% higher among those diagnosed within five years of giving birth than those who had not given birth.

In women 55 years and younger, breast cancer risk peaked about five years after they gave birth.

The risk for mothers is 80% higher compared to women who did not give birth.

Care Beyond Houston

Five Mobile Mammography Coaches! Five! Who would have ever imagined that our Mobile Mammography Program would grow so much in six years and serve so many people?

Thank you to our Anonymous Donor who saw the need for breast cancer screening beyond Houston and shares our dream of access to care for all.

Hats off to those who take action to save lives, one mammogram at a time, mile after mile.

Did you know?

- 77% of all our mobile patients (insured and uninsured) report they would not have had their annual mammogram if our coach hadn't gone to their community. What would have been their outcome without The Rose?
- 31 of the 43 counties we serve either have one mammography facility or none. We are filling a critical gap in care in each of these counties.
- Every coach is capable of serving 15 - 24 patients per mobile day.
- The Mobile Mammography Program screens, on average, 9,000 women annually.
- Appointments and bookings are scheduled in advance, and the mobile coaches visit employers, clinics, schools, Federally Qualified Health Centers, nonprofits, and many other partner sites.
- Our coaches travel from Bay City to Tenaha and Giddings to Beaumont; a land mass about the size of the state of Indiana.

Facing Breast Cancer at 37

A bag of mulch led Ana to discover a lump in her breast — a turning point that unveiled her battle with Stage III Invasive Ductal Carcinoma at just 37 years old.

After playful teasing from her son about whether she was strong enough to carry a bag of mulch, she grabbed the bag and held it close to her chest, only to immediately feel pain in her breast. After putting the mulch down, she felt a lump, but dismissed it as a possible injury from attempting to carry such a heavy bag.

The following day, she felt the lump again, only this time she brought it to her husband's attention. Together, they decided that she needed to see a doctor.

Ana was only 37 years old when she was diagnosed with Stage III Invasive Ductal Carcinoma. She would need chemotherapy, radiation, and ultimately, a double mastectomy. Going through treatment for any patient is difficult, but during COVID, it meant learning her diagnosis and facing each doctor's appointment, every treatment, and hospital stay alone.

"My three boys are my reason for staying positive through the whole process," says Ana. "I had to keep going, for them."

Her family lifted her spirits throughout her journey, while The Rose helped Ana and her family by navigating them through the labyrinth of breast healthcare while she underwent costly treatment. Thanks to The Rose, Ana could focus on tackling breast cancer and her recovery, knowing that our

team was available to assist every step of the way.

"I am so grateful to The Rose for leading me to the right resources, I'm so blessed," says Ana.

Describing finding her cancer as a "miracle," Ana is now an advocate for breast self-exams and regular mammograms.

"Check yourself because it can be a lifesaver," says Ana. "If it happened to me, it can happen to you. Mammograms save lives."



Ana shares a tender moment with her son, finding beauty in bravery. Her path to embracing baldness was paved with love, as her husband shaved his head first, standing by her in her fight against breast cancer.


